Mariclaire Acosta is Professor at the *Centro de Investigación y Docencia Económica* (CIDE) in Mexico City. In the fall of 2010 she will occupy the UNESCO Chair in 'Education for Peace, Democracy and Human Rights' at Utrecht University. She has been a human right defender for more than three decades. She has published widely on issues of human rights and legal reform and held several visiting professorial positions at US universities. From 2001 to 2003, she was undersecretary for Human Rights and Democracy in Mexico Ministry of Foreign Affairs. After that she worked at the Organization of American State in Washington and was director of the Americas section of the International Center for Transitional Justice in New York.

John Holloway is a Professor at the *Benemérita Universidad Autónoma de Puebla* (BUAP), Puebla, Mexico. He has published on Marxist theory, on the Zapatista movement (especially *Zapatista*, edited with Eloína Peláez, Pluto Press, London, 1998) and on the new forms of anti-capitalist struggle. For many years, he was one of the editors of *Revista Chiapas* and has been involved in Latin American debates about the significance of movements like the Zapatista and Piquetero movements. His book *Change the World without taking Power* (Pluto, London, 2002, new edition 2010) stirred an international debate within the anti-globalization movement, which he hopes to continue with his new book, *Crack Capitalism* (Pluto, 2010).

Lucía Sá is Professor of Brazilian Cultural Studies at the University of Manchester. She worked at Stanford University from 1999 to 2006 and has been visiting professor in US and European universities. She has published widely on Brazilian popular culture and literature and Latin American cities. She is the author of two books, *Life in the Megalopolis: Mexico City and São Paulo* (Routledge, 2007) and *Rain Forest Literatures: Indigenous Texts and Latin American Culture* (University of Minnesota Press, 2004), and she has edited two books, *Euclides da Cunha, At the Margins of History: Amazon Essays* (Oxford University Press, 2006), and *Aluísio Azevedo, Os Demônios* (Editora Martins Fontes, 2007).



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
